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### From The Chief's Desk ...

2004 was an incredible year for Stayton Fire District.

The year started off with the continuation of the Strategic Plan that included a list of priorities established in four specific areas: training, equipment, facilities, and apparatus.

The plan identified very important issues that gave the District its direction for long-term goals. One major issue the plan brought to light was the lack of funding to purchase large equipment such as air packs and fire engines and the need to replace aging fire engines and worn out air packs that were starting to fail on a regular basis.

Armed with this information, the Volunteers, Staff and Board of Directors created a plan to generate the funding for the badly needed equipment. The plan included two major strategies: to identify any grants available and to ask the citizens for their support. In March, the District applied for a federal grant called the FIRE ACT. This grant would be used to purchase new air packs. Then work was done to identify the real apparatus needs and the most cost-effective way to purchase that equipment. Once the amount of funds needed was established, a plan to inform and educate the citizens was created. The plan included making posters and flyers, talking to civic groups, holding events in all four communities, and conducting door-to-door information campaigns. All of this was carried out by the Volunteers and members of the community that recognized the need and helped deliver the message.

During this time, the Volunteers were also busy completing other projects identified in the plan such as renovating the outside of our Marion Station. With an amazing amount of help and guidance from Ken Studnick and his crew, the Volunteers and Staff were able to remove and replace all of the old siding and several windows at a huge cost savings to the tax payers. Renovation of the kitchen and bathrooms, as well as a vigorous outside cleaning of our station in Mehama, was also completed by the Volunteers and Staff.

After months of meetings and presentations, the deadline to place the bond measure on the ballot arrived. Having not heard from the Federal Government about our grant application, we filed the bond for the needed funds to purchase the equipment.

Within two weeks of filing, we were notified that our grant had been awarded and they would be making the funds available for us to purchase all new air packs and supporting equipment. The only condition to the grant was that we had to provide a 10% match of the total cost of the project, or about \$23,000. The notice came too late to change the bond amount so the Board of Directors decided that, if the bond passed, we would lower the amount of taxes to be levied by \$200,000 leaving us enough extra in the bond to pay the match.

On Election Day, the Volunteers and other supporters gathered at Ugo's Pizza (a great supporter of the District and the bond measure) to celebrate the work they had accomplished during the last year and to monitor the elections results. After seeing that our bond measure was being approved by the voters by a significant margin, the Volunteers were filled with appreciation for the citizen's response to the bond.

Although the initial excitement was for the new apparatus, within hours the firefighter's thoughts began to shift to what the citizens were saying. They began to realize the success of the bond held another message, equally important to them as the equipment and their safety. They began to realize just how much the community believed in and appreciated them and what they do. I can honestly tell you from a Fire Chief's perspective, there is nothing greater for the morale and health of a volunteer fire district than that message sent by the people.

New air packs have been ordered, new fire trucks are being designed and the Volunteers continue to dedicate themselves to providing the community with outstanding service. Stay tuned during the next year to find out how your tax dollars are being used and how fortunate this community is to have such dedicated Volunteers.

### Juvenile Firesetter Program

Our Juvenile Firesetter Intervention program's mission is to reduce the incidence of fire by establishing a continuum of care for child firesetters and their families. Juvenile fire setting is more involved than just filling out a screening form and processing the paperwork. Our JFS specialist meets with the family no less than four times. The youth is given homework assignments, interviews and, depending on their age, community service.

Many times we deal with kids who have personality disorders, such as ADHD, and abuse issues. To help the youth and their family, we take classes dealing with hard to handle children, abuse and ne-

glect education and specialized areas of attention deficit hyperactive disorder.

Of the six reported last year, the majority were male youths between 8-10 years old, using lighters to ignite everything from paper towels to bedroom curtains. We deal with youths living in the Stayton Fire District as well as other districts in the canyon.

#### **Training Division**

Stayton Fire Districts training division is committed to training personnel to meet the needs of our mission statement, "To provide outstanding service with commitment to saving lives and property".

A core of dedicated volunteers and minimal career staff train weekly to prepare for a variety of calls for service. The fire district's personnel train to respond on medicals, vehicle accidents, building fires, hazardous materials spills and leaks, wildland fires, and various other incidents.

In 2004, Stayton Fire District personnel trained a total of 3,842 hours which averages out to 64 hours per firefighter in training alone. Included in these hours are weekly night drills, weekend classes, seminars, workshops and conferences. The District strives to provide as much training as possible locally to allow as many volunteers to attend. Weekly drills provide all personnel with the basic skills to respond to a variety of calls. Weekend classes, workshops, seminars and conferences require additional time and provide knowledge beyond the basics.

The future of training grows at a rapid pace. Personnel time is an important issue; volunteer's time is valuable and must be used wisely.

Technology has introduced the ability to offer classes online and obtain knowledge on the Internet to help lesson the time required. The challenge remains the same, time. The vision of the Stayton Fire District is "We will continue to meet the expanding needs of our communities while maintaining a core of dedicated Volunteers". As the needs of the communities grow, so will the training and knowledge of those who serve you.




Rope Rescue Training


#### **Staffing for Calls for Service**

Stayton Fire District utilizes 60 Volunteer firefighters in 4 stations and 5 career personnel in Stayton, to provide 24 hour/365 days a year emergency response. The 5 career personnel staff the Stayton station, Monday-Friday from 8 AM to 5 PM during the times Volunteer staffing is low. The Volunteer firefighters respond when they are available and provide the primary response in the evenings and on weekends. The District is considered a combination fire department utilizing career personnel to supplement a dedicated and committed Volunteer core.


#### 2004 Fire Calls By Type Excluding Mutual Aid

#### Recruitment 2004

Approximately halfway through 2004, we began a new system of tracking applications for Firefighter and Support of those hoping to join our district throughout a given year. The goal was to use these statistics to improve our recruiting and retention of volunteers district-wide.

The National Fire Academy works to enhance the ability of fire and emergency services to deal more effectively with fire and related emergencies by providing this training with minimal cost to the fire district.




