2008 was another great year in what is becoming a long line of quality years for Stayton Fire District. A number of facilities projects, equipment purchases, grant programs, and keeping an eye on safety has kept Stayton Fire District busy throughout the year.

The memorial in front of the Stayton station, which actually started in the fall of 2007, became the focus of attention during the summer of 2008. Many members of the district and community contributed a great deal of time and energy to the project. None more important than the efforts of Rich and Tim Manning of Manning Concrete; Tim and Rich made a vision become reality by taking a rough drawing of a concept developed by members of the Fire District and turned it into an incredible reality.

The District was notified in February that it had been selected to receive a \$69,135 grant from the Federal Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program to purchase and equip a support unit. Through a lengthy process, a 28' trailer was designed and custom-built to provide for the needs of the District in a wide range of situations. The trailer will provide support to fire operations such as rehabilitation for firefighters, an operations center for long duration incidents, or a rest area for the public at functions like Summerfest and other community events.

The trailer is equipped with portable power, lighting, inflatable shelters, decontamination stations, toilets, chairs and tables. In addition to all the portable equipment, the trailer is also self-sufficient with its own power, bathroom, water, refrigerator, microwave, radio, and a multi-use area that can be used for office space, patient care, firefighter rehabilitation, or other uses. It is also equipped with medical monitoring equipment designed to take vital signs and track the physical condition of firefighters working at an incident. The

trailer will have a significant impact on the District's ability to provide support to its firefighters and the community.

Although the District has been extremely successful in many areas, our greatest success has been in our growing attitude towards safety and "everyone goes home". It never ceases to amaze me what volunteers are willing to give for their community but the last thing we want them to give is their health or well-being.


Over the past few years Stayton Fire District has worked diligently to change it's culture from that of safety being an afterthought to it being our first thought. As a result of the efforts of the firefighters and the District, we sustained only one lost time accident in 2008. In 2009 we will continue to focus on safety as our number one priority, doing the right thing for the right reason, and ensuring that everyone goes home.



This year's fire prevention theme was "Home Fire Safety Is Up To You." A new program was used with the Pre-K and Kindergarten students that asked the students to become Fire Inspectors. A series of flash cards and story boards were used and the students were asked what things were "safe for play" or what things were" keep away." This was a big hit with both the teachers and the students. We also teach on smoke alarms, calling 9-1-1, home escape plans, and how firefighters are their friends.


The older students were asked what types of things they thought were fire hazards; they came up with some very good answers, which showed us that they had a good knowledge of how to prevent fires. We


Incidents by Day of Week





In 2008 the fire district saw a lot of projects happen in the facilities department beginning with the memorial at the Stayton station. Rich Manning's crew did an outstanding job with the concrete work followed by the staff and volunteers putting in the sod, flag poles, and lighting. Although the much of the physical structure is complete, the statues still remain to be purchased and installed. The District continues to work with the VFW chapter here in Stayton on a grant application that would provide funding for the fallen soldier statue. The District is working on finding funding sources for the fallen firefighter statue and law enforcement statues. We truly hope this becomes a symbol of respect for all those whom have given so much so that we may enjoy the quality of life we have in our country.

We went right from the memorial project to completely re-carpeting the main station. With all the furniture moved out, it was a good time to give all the rooms a fresh coat of paint.

The next project on the agenda was repairing the moisture damage in the weight room. We had a county corrections crew come in and demo the old dry wall. A roofing company then found and repaired the leak. Captain Kintz and FF Mullen installed new dry wall, taped, textured, and painted the room. Captain Kintz donated and installed a great sound system for our workouts. The room looks great and has seen an increase in use.



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Next up was refurbishing the bays at the Elkhorn station. Volunteers from all stations helped clean and paint the walls, and then Captain Kintz and FF Mullen painted, sealed, and restriped the bay floors.

Several smaller projects were accomplished during the year also. The apparatus bays at Station 80 had the old wax stripped off to the floor and new wax laid down, the bay lights at Mehama were lowered so staff can work on them in a safer manner a concrete patio was poured in the back of the station. The mechanic's shop received a coat of epoxy paint on the floor, and AC Alley finally got electricity in the storage building at the training facility.



The District continues to look toward grants to assist in accomplishing its mission to provide outstanding service with a commitment to saving lives and property. In 2008, the District applied for two FEMA grants.

- 1) An Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) for \$101,818 to purchase needed radio equipment for responders on emergency scenes. We are still waiting to hear if we will be awarded this grant.
- 2) The District also applied for a Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant to improve volunteer recruitment and retention. The requested \$218,130 would provide for a temporary 2-year staff position and marketing and advertising supplies that will focus on volunteer recruitment and improvements to our volunteer retention program.

In 2008, the District was awarded two grants; an AFG grant for \$69,135 and a USDA grant for \$75,000. The AFG grant will provide the District and our neighboring agencies with a comprehensive rehabilitation solution (28' equipped rehab trailer) that will help protect the physical and mental well-being and safety

of personnel on fire scenes. The USDA grant will enable the District to make improvements to the Marion Fire Station.

~Information Systems

The largest project for 2008 in regards to our information systems, was the total transformation of our website. The new site is easier to update and has a lot of tools that make it more useful. One of the biggest changes was the addition of a calendar. This allows both the public and volunteers to keep up with what is happening, including training and events.

The software allows the site to be updated from any computer with Internet and Windows Explorer – allowing more staff members to assist with maintaining the site. There is still of lot of exciting things on the list to add, including a photo gallery and individual station pages.

The District also installed two used Toughbook computers in the rescue and engine at the Stayton station. This is the first step in providing our firefighters computer access to map information. In the future, we hope to link directly to the Dispatch Center and our Firehouse Software.

We continue to expand our use of Firehouse Software by tracking all incidents, staff, inventory, maintenance, and training, and have started entering commercial occupancy information to update our incident preplans. The program is very powerful and we are always discovering new ways to use the software and the information it provides.

hen districts unite, good things happen! The Juvenile Fire Setter Intervention Program has been in affect for years but we are barely touching the tip of the iceberg. For every two juveniles who go through the program, there are three that we never hear about.

With encouragement from staff, I called other districts around the valley that I have assisted with interventions. To my amazement several departments responded and helped purchase a training DVD and workbooks. This new DVD includes interviews with kids who were charged with arson and how it affected their lives then and four years later. Seeing and hearing these first-hand accounts has a powerful impact on these kids. The DVD also contains several techniques that are useful for interviewing juveniles and parents.

This new material will benefit not only the Stayton Fire District, but the surrounding districts, with training and education for the Juvenile Fire Setters Intervention Program.

The District's Support team assists the district with canteen services on fire scenes, office support, Pub Ed, work parties, fund raisers, and many other projects. In

2008 they also worked on two special projects. With donations from community sponsors, they assembled preparedness kits and



raffled them at the May breakfast to raise funds for the Smoke Alarm Program. They also put together a Fire Relief Barrel, which is a large wheeled plastic garbage can filled with items that will help a family who's lost their home due to a fire.

~ Annual Golf Tournament



This year the Volunteers celebrated their 20th anniversary for the annual golf tournament to raise funds for the Oregon Burn Center. Volunteers, friends, and supporters of

the District enjoyed the beautiful day, warm sunshine, and gorgeous backdrop of the Elkhorn Valley Golf Course.



The goal for this 20th anniversary was to raise \$10,000, nearly three times as much as usual. But everyone outdid themselves this year and several volunteers were proud to make the trip to Portland to present a check for \$15,000!!

Since starting the tournament in 1988, the volunteers and sponsors have contributed approximately \$60,000 to the Burn Center.


The training of our personnel extends well beyond the two hour weekly Thursday night drills; many hours are sacrificed on week nights and weekends. These hours include classes, conferences, seminars, and workshops. Training includes but is not limited to structural firefighting, Emergency Medical Services, vehicle fires, hazardous materials, wild land firefighting, motor vehicle accident response, traffic control, jaws of life (extrication), fire prevention, rescues (water & rope), support services, and operations of fire apparatus.

The district's training program has a dedicated group of individuals who assist with the vision, development, and delivery of training of firefighters and support personnel. These volunteers provide the leadership for learning and skills for survival. Without these individuals the quality and quantity of training offered locally would not be possible.

The safety of our firefighters is our first priority, with the knowledge, skills, and experience second. The district has set a high standard of excellence for training of its personnel and utilizes technology and tradition as the foundation of the program.




