


held the Officer ranks of Lt., Captain, and Division Chief for 15 years of his fire service career.

Distractions and Driving Smart



Distracted driving is the motor vehicle safety issue of our time, and is quickly becoming an epidemic in America. Although it's completely preventable, people are still falling victim to its dangers.

Cars are increasingly equipped with technology to keep drivers connected while on the road, but a new study says it can take 27 seconds for a driver using a voice-activated entertainment system to regain full alertness after making a command from behind the wheel. That means a car going 25 mph can travel the length of three football fields before a driver's brain fully recovers from the act of dialing a phone number or changing music!

Studies have shown:

- People may have an assumption that if it's in a car it must have been fully tested and really good. Not true. Just because its in the car and its possible to do it, doesn't mean we should.
- Drivers who think it is safer to send a text when stopped at a red light or a stop sign are mistaken. Even the least distracting systems can leave drivers impaired for more than 15 seconds after completing a task. The results indicate that motorists could miss pedestrians and other vehicles while the mind is readjusting to the task of driving.
- Reading and sending texts and emails is a major distraction but also consider these – eating while driving, fussing with loose objects in our vehicles, tending to our children, applying makeup, reading a map or talking on the phone.

Here are AAA's Top 10 Tips to Avoid Distractions While Driving.

10. Fully focus on driving. Do not let anything divert your attention, actively scan the road, use your mirrors and watch out for pedestrians and cyclists.

9. Store loose gear, possessions and other distractions that could roll around in the car, so you do not feel tempted to reach for them on the floor or the seat.

8. Make adjustments before you begin your trip. Address vehicle systems like your GPS, seats, mirrors, climate controls and sound systems before hitting the road. Decide on your route and check traffic conditions ahead of time.

7. Finish dressing and personal grooming at home – before you get on the road.

6. Snack smart. If possible, eat meals or snacks before or after your trip, not while driving. On the road, avoid messy foods that can be difficult to manage.

5. Secure children and pets before getting underway. If they need your attention, pull off the road safely to care for them. Reaching into the backseat can cause you to lose control of the vehicle.

4. Put aside your electronic distractions. Don't use cell phones while driving – handheld or hands-free – except in absolute emergencies. Never use text messaging, email functions, video games or the internet with a wireless device, including those built into the vehicle, while driving.

3. If you have passengers, enlist their help so you can focus safely on driving.

2. If another activity demands your attention, instead of trying to attempt it while driving, pull off the road and stop your vehicle in a safe place. To avoid temptation, power down or stow devices before heading out. Drivers should use caution while using voice-activated systems, even at seemingly safe moments when there is a lull in traffic or the car is stopped at an intersection, because potentially dangerous distractions can last longer than most drivers expect.

1. As a general rule, if you cannot devote your full attention to driving because of some other activity, it's a distraction. Take care of it before or after your trip, not while behind the wheel.


