In an effort to increase the usefulness of

the Districts Website, we have been following a plan to increase traffic and awareness of the activities of the district. One of the ways in which we are making some progress is the following of people on our Twitter account. We currently have over 300 Twitter followers which has increased our ability to share information to the public, and control what news gets out and when. In recent weeks, several media outlets have contacted the District for follow up on information they read on the Twitter feed, leading to some positive media exposure in local markets.

Safety Spot

- Check/change furnace filters
- Inspect your fireplace and make sure your chimney is clean
- Remove all flammable material from around your furnace
- Install/inspect smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors, and fire extinguishers
- Locate your water shutoff, insulate exposed plumbing pipes, drain garden hoses and AC pipes
- Weather-strip around doors and windows

Your Safety Committee encourages you to prepare for the upcoming season by suggesting the following safety and inspection tips for your home and vehicles:

- Check your home and roadside emergency kits for proper supplies
- Check your vehicles for good tires, wiper blades, and proper fluids
- Inspect radiator hoses and fan belts for cracks and wear
- Make sure your spare tire, jack and tools are ready for use
- Check that your lights, heaters, and defrosters are working properly



Cooler weather will soon be approaching and many people will pull out their space heaters, cover up with electric blankets, or light the fireplace. Here are some safety tips to keep in mind as you turn up the heat this fall and winter.



There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

-))) Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
-))) Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
-))) Never use your oven to heat your home.
-))) Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
-))) Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
-))) Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
-))) Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
-))) Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
-))) Test smoke alarms monthly.

Heating Equipment

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

FACT

Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of December, January, and February.
