DISTRICT HONORS CHIEF JACK CARRIGER'S YEARS OF SERVICE


Chief Carriger began his fire service career in 1986 as a volunteer with MCFD #1. In 1996, he was hired as the first full-time paid Fire Chief at Nestucca Fire District, and then in 2002 he was hired as the second full-time Fire Chief for Stayton Fire District. Prior to his fire service career, he was a reserve deputy for Marion

County Sheriff Office for 10 years. He has a total of 46 years in emergency services!

Chief Carriger had a strong background, passion and commitment to the volunteer fire service. He served as President for Oregon Volunteer Firefighter Association and

with his involvement at the state level he became active with the National Volunteer Fire Council serving on the Executive Board.

During Chief Carriger's 20 years with Stayton Fire District, he had several significant accomplishments; he secured over \$4 million dollars in grants, obtained his Associate Degree in Fire Science, developed a financial plan that has served the district well and will into the future, and promoted a strong sense of pride and own-



Cooking Fire Safety

Cooking is a leading cause of residential fires and fire casualties.

Families gather in the kitchen to spend time together, but it can be one of the most dangerous rooms in the

house if you don't practice safe cooking behaviors. Whether you are cooking the family holiday dinner or a snack for children, practicing safe cooking behaviors will help keep you and your family safe.



To learn how to prevent a cooking fire in your home and how to keep members of your household safe in case of fire, read the home fire safety information provided below.

Here are some cooking fire safety tips:

- Keep an eye on what you're cooking- don't leave cooking unattended.
- Keep your cooking areas clean and clear of combustibles (potholders, food packaging, towels, etc.) and wipe up surface spills.
- Create a three-foot kid- and pet-free zone around the stove.
- Older children should only cook with permission and under the supervision of an adult.
- Have a lid or cookie sheet within reach while cooking (to smother flames) in case of a fire.

Safety tips for if a cooking fire does start:

- Put a lid on it! Slide a lid over the pan (from the side) and then turn off the burner.
- Don't move the pan until the fire is completely extinguished and cooled, and don't try to transfer the pan to the sink.

If you cannot extinguish the fire:

- Get you and your family safely out of the house.
- If you can, close doors as you are escaping, to help contain the fire.
- Call 911 from a safe place (outside).

Home for the Holidays: 7 Ways to Decorate Safely

- * Check all holiday light cords to ensure they aren't frayed or broken. Don't string too many strands of lights together no more than three per extension cord. Turn off all holiday lights when going to bed or leaving the house.
- * Ensure outside decorations are for outdoor use and fasten lights securely to your home or trees. If using hooks or nails outside, make sure they are insulated to avoid an electrocution or fire hazard.
- * Look for the fire-resistant label when buying an artificial tree. Keep it away from fireplaces, radiators and other sources of heat. Never use electric lights on metallic trees.
- * If getting a live tree, make sure it's fresh and keep it watered. Bend the needles up and down to make sure no needles fall off.
- **Don't light the fireplace** if hanging stockings on the mantel.
- * Check the labels of older decorations. Some older tinsel is lead-based. If using angel hair, wear gloves to avoid irritation. Avoid breathing in artificial snow.
- * Have good, stable placement when using a ladder and wear shoes that allow for good traction.
